


*8 working telephone numbers to complete one interview.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Touts he voted with Trump 94% of the time but supported Trump’s impeachment. Weathering attack that he has enriched himself while in office. Reportedly reaching out to D’s for support in the primary race to avoid a run-off. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Being attacked for missing more than 600 votes as a state legislator. Also depicted by Rice as a “tax and spender.”
Bottom Line:	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Recent polls show Fry leading, propelled by Trump’s endorsement. Likely to go to run-off, favoring Fry. GOP primary voters are unlikely to forgive Rice for voting for Trump’s impeachment. 	
 		

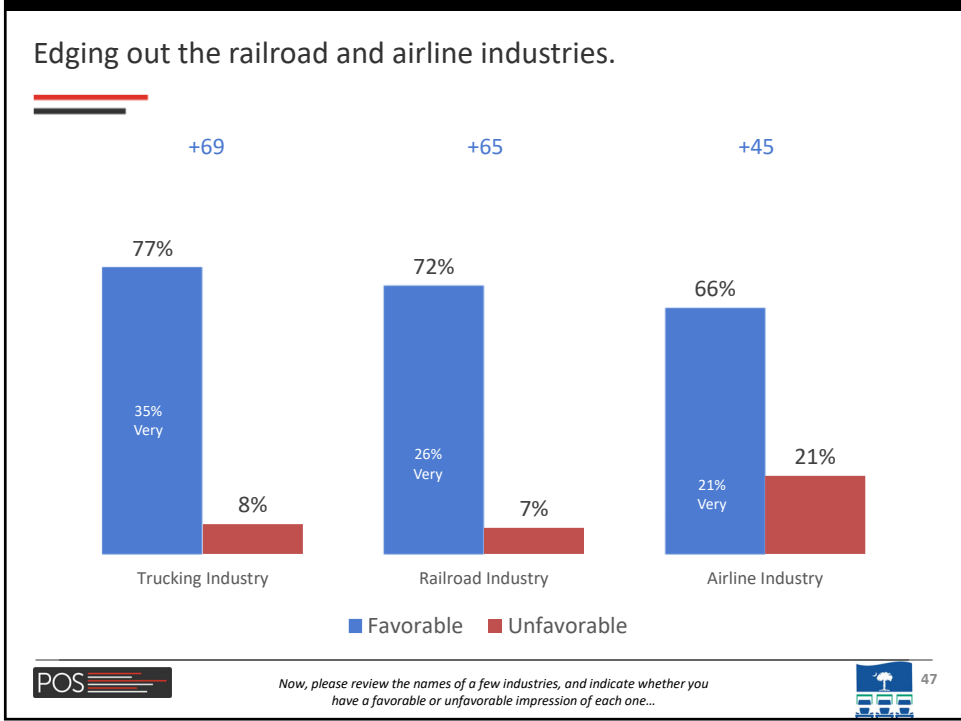

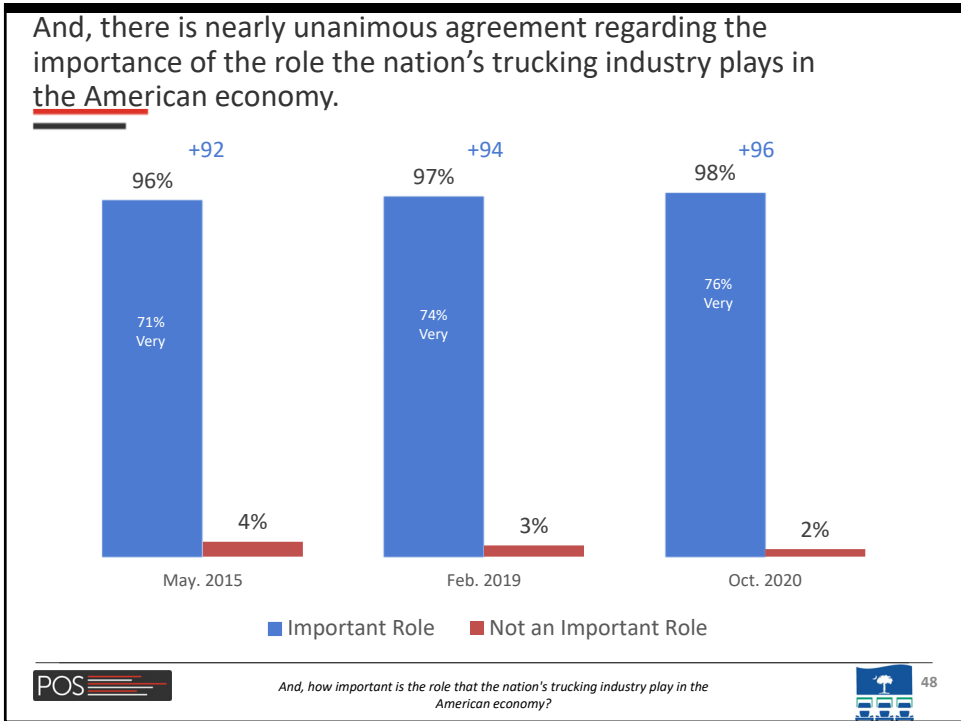

Those with the strongest favorable image of the trucking industry include...

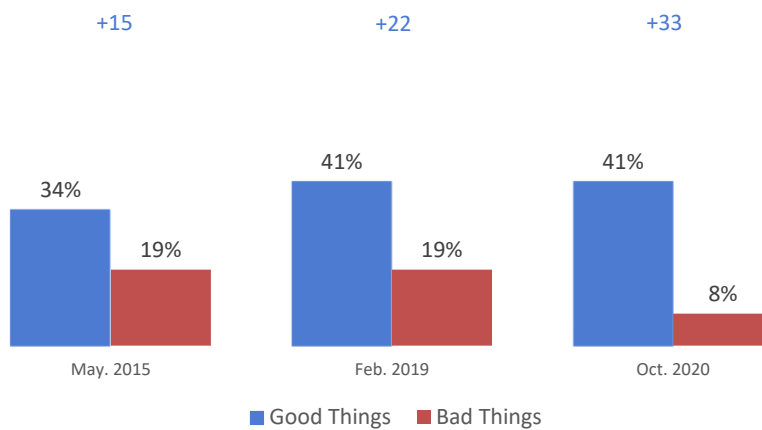
Republicans – 44% very favorable

Take-Away Points

1. The country is facing a pandemic of mistrust, and that mood is being fed by niche media outlets that voters believe are deliberately trying to mislead Americans. Against that backdrop, President Biden is struggling to get traction on economic issues that are vital to his party's chances in November.
2. The deck is pretty clearly stacked against him and his party, as Republicans appear poised to pick up the US House and probably the Senate.

Take-Away Points

3. **GOP control of Congress may actually be a benefit to President Biden as he will have an “enemy” to castigate rather than members of his own party (Senator Joe Manchin!).**
4. **Don’t assume that a weak showing by DEMs this November is a ticket to a GOP Presidency in 2024. Biden can still resurrect his Presidency and Trump may be his perfect foil.**
